OVERVIEW OF JAPANESE LANGUAGE COURSE

An elementary level Japanese language course under the banner 'Japanese Language Pilot Project (JLPP)' has been instituted in Utkal University as a pilot project and the course has been offered to students, scholars, faculty members and few outsiders, since the academic year 2015-16. The JLPP was initiated under the auspices of PG Department of Anthropology, Utkal University with a modest objective of providing the exposure of Japanese language and culture to the fraternity of Utkal University. The Centre has moderately achieved its objectives.

Since then, the JLPP has successfully completed five batches of the course (2015 – 2018 AND 2021-22). During the period, around 80 participants have been offered elementary level Japanese language course, 7 students have appeared before N5 – JLPT test, four students have visited Japan under JENESYS-1 &2 students exchange programme, two 'One-Day with Japan' events, 4 film screenings, 3 seminars, 1 roundtable discussion, 2 Platinum Jubilee Distinguished Lectures, two times visit by His Excellency the Ambassador of Japan, 4 times visit by the Consulate General of Japan in Kolkata and several other events have been organized by JLPP, although, the course got affected during the year 2020-21, owing to Covid-19 related restrictions.

Objectives of the Language Course

- a) Primarily to provide an opportunity to learn Japanese as a foreign language, along with than an exposure to Japanese society, culture, science and technology.
- b) Provide a chance to M. Phil. and Ph.D scholars of various departments of the university, so that they can utilise it as a medium to understand Japanese culture and society, to explore avenues for collaborative research with scholars in Japan. It may help scholars from social sciences to use it for primary data collection.
- c) Japanese language knowledge may help in gainful employment.

Status of JLPP

(1) Resource Person / Visiting Professor: The elementary level course is taught by Dr. Prasanna Kumar Patra (Cordinator of JLPP) who deals with *Hiragana* and *Katakana* alphabets and some basic counting and vocabularies. The upper level is taught by Prof. Nabin Kumar Panda, Professor of Japanese Language at Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi, who was instrumental in initiating JLPP at Utkal University and who had been voluntarily offering his services to the initiative since 2015. He is a renowned Japanese language teacher in India and has kindly agreed to be available as a Resource Person (visiting Professor) for whenever he is available. Out of the last five years, he has offered teaching three years (2015-16, 2017-18 and 2021-22).

- (2) Period of Course: A course has been designed for a period of three-months consisting of about 15 to 20 students (drawn from PG final year students and PhD research scholars, and with 20% window for non-students/ outsiders).
- (3) Admission Procedure: The intake of the students is made on the basis of entrance test (language aptitude and GK) followed by personal interview. Open advertisement is put in the Department Notice Boards. The announcement is generally made in the 1st week of October, Entrance Test and PI in the 3rdweek and the foundational classes start in the 4th week of October. There is a max of 20 seats with 15 % (3 seats) made available to non-students or outsiders on merit basis (based on entrance and PI). Preference is given to M.Phil and Ph.D scholars.
- (a) Course Fee: For the last five sessions, the course has been made available **Free of Cost**.
- (b) *Course*: Books followed: (i) Minna no Nihongo (ii) Audio-lingual method and (c) Communicative approach. It is hoped to develop four skills such as, Reading, Listening, Writing and Speaking.
- (c) *Time table:* There is 2 hours class for 4 days a week. However, on mutual understanding between the teacher and students the time table for the class may be arranged / rearranged.
- (d) *Certificate:* There is no provision of giving certificates. However, a course completion letter can be given to interested students by the Course Coordinator and Head of the Department of Anthropology.
- (e) *JLPT N5:* The Resource Person / Visiting Professor, Prof. Panda takes necessary steps in providing skill-based training to interested candidates on this.
- (f) *Exchange Programme / Exposure*: Four students, so far, have availed JENESYS-1 &2 Students' Exchange programme offered by the Japanese Embassy and Japan Foundation. They have visited Japan and have made homestay there for a period of one week.

(g) Achievents by JLPP

- Since 2015-16 the JLPP has successfully completed four batches of the course (2015 2019). During the period, around 70 participants have been offered elementary level Japanese language course
- Seven (7) students have appeared before N5 JLPT test in 2016-17)

- Four students have visited Japan under JENESYS-1 & 2 students exchange programme (3 in 2016-17) & (1 in 2017-18).
- Two 'One-Day with Japan' events, 4 film screenings, 2 calligraphy events, 3 seminars, 1 roundtable discussion conducted under the auspices of JLPP.
- Two (2) Platinum Jubilee Distinguished Lectures delivered under JLPP initiatives involving the Mr. Kenji HIRAMATSU, His Excellency, the Ambassador of Japan & Prof. MIZOKAMI Tomio, Padmashree and President of Kansai Japan-India Cultural Society, Kobe, Japan on 24.08.2018
- Two times visit by His Excellency the Ambassador of Japan, 4 times visit by the Consulate General of Japan in Kolkata and several other events have been organized by JLPP. The course got affected during the year 2019-202020-21, owing to Covid-19 related restrictions.

COURSE OUTLINE

The course has been designed to introduce the rudiments of Japanese language by emphasising all the four functions of a language, namely, listening, reading, writing, and speaking. It was a course work of about 80 hours divided into three classes a week, each class consisting of one and half an hour duration.

The classes were conducted by using the techniques from Structural-Functional Method, Audio-Lingual Method and Communicative Approach where emphasis was put on learning through repetitive practice and Role Play.

The following is the details of the course work.

Writing system and Lessons

- 1. Hiragana and Katakana Syllabary (五十音図)
- 2. Kanji (漢字): 1 to 100 from Nihongo Challenge (日本語チャレンジ)
- 3. Basic vocabulary pertaining to everyday use regarding a) Introducing oneself and others, b) Asking for destination, c) Requesting for things and favours, d) Invitation and polite denials etc.
- 4. Lessons 1 to 10 from Minna no Nihongo (みんなの日本語)

Evaluation

Week end class tests were conducted to get the feed-back about the achievement level. Further, learners were asked to write short passages after the completion of each lesson.

Expected outcome

Learners have been advised to take the Level 5 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test to be held in July or December, 2022 by the government agencies of Japan. It is expected the learners will be able clear this test with continuous touch with class notes and text book and other materials.

OVERVIEW OF JAPANESE LANGUAGE COURSE

An elementary level Japanese language course under the banner 'Japanese Language Pilot Project (JLPP)' has been instituted in Utkal University as a pilot project and the course has been offered to students, scholars, faculty members and few outsiders, since the academic year 2015-16. The JLPP was initiated under the auspices of PG Department of Anthropology, Utkal University with a modest objective of providing the exposure of Japanese language and culture to the fraternity of Utkal University. The Centre has moderately achieved its objectives.

Since then, the JLPP has successfully completed five batches of the course (2015 – 2018 AND 2021-22). During the period, around 80 participants have been offered elementary level Japanese language course, 7 students have appeared before N5 – JLPT test, four students have visited Japan under JENESYS-1 &2 students exchange programme, two 'One-Day with Japan' events, 4 film screenings, 3 seminars, 1 roundtable discussion, 2 Platinum Jubilee Distinguished Lectures, two times visit by His Excellency the Ambassador of Japan, 4 times visit by the Consulate General of Japan in Kolkata and several other events have been organized by JLPP, although, the course got affected during the year 2020-21, owing to Covid-19 related restrictions.

Objectives of the Language Course

- a) Primarily to provide an opportunity to learn Japanese as a foreign language, along with than an exposure to Japanese society, culture, science and technology.
- b) Provide a chance to M. Phil. and Ph.D scholars of various departments of the university, so that they can utilise it as a medium to understand Japanese culture and society, to explore avenues for collaborative research with scholars in Japan. It may help scholars from social sciences to use it for primary data collection.
- c) Japanese language knowledge may help in gainful employment.

Status of JLPP

(1) Resource Person / Visiting Professor: The elementary level course is taught by Dr. Prasanna Kumar Patra (Cordinator of JLPP) who deals with *Hiragana* and *Katakana* alphabets and some basic counting and vocabularies. The upper level is taught by Prof. Nabin Kumar Panda, Professor of Japanese Language at Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi, who was instrumental in initiating JLPP at Utkal University and who had been voluntarily offering his services to the initiative since 2015. He is a renowned Japanese language teacher in India and has kindly agreed to be available as a Resource Person (visiting Professor) for whenever he is available. Out of the last five years, he has offered teaching three years (2015-16, 2017-18 and 2021-22).

- (2) Period of Course: A course has been designed for a period of three-months consisting of about 15 to 20 students (drawn from PG final year students and PhD research scholars, and with 20% window for non-students/ outsiders).
- (3) Admission Procedure: The intake of the students is made on the basis of entrance test (language aptitude and GK) followed by personal interview. Open advertisement is put in the Department Notice Boards. The announcement is generally made in the 1st week of October, Entrance Test and PI in the 3rdweek and the foundational classes start in the 4th week of October. There is a max of 20 seats with 15 % (3 seats) made available to non-students or outsiders on merit basis (based on entrance and PI). Preference is given to M.Phil and Ph.D scholars.
- (a) Course Fee: For the last five sessions, the course has been made available **Free of Cost**.
- (b) *Course*: Books followed: (i) Minna no Nihongo (ii) Audio-lingual method and (c) Communicative approach. It is hoped to develop four skills such as, Reading, Listening, Writing and Speaking.
- (c) *Time table:* There is 2 hours class for 4 days a week. However, on mutual understanding between the teacher and students the time table for the class may be arranged / rearranged.
- (d) *Certificate:* There is no provision of giving certificates. However, a course completion letter can be given to interested students by the Course Coordinator and Head of the Department of Anthropology.
- (e) *JLPT N5:* The Resource Person / Visiting Professor, Prof. Panda takes necessary steps in providing skill-based training to interested candidates on this.
- (f) *Exchange Programme / Exposure*: Four students, so far, have availed JENESYS-1 &2 Students' Exchange programme offered by the Japanese Embassy and Japan Foundation. They have visited Japan and have made homestay there for a period of one week.

(g) Achievents by JLPP

- Since 2015-16 the JLPP has successfully completed four batches of the course (2015 2019). During the period, around 70 participants have been offered elementary level Japanese language course
- Seven (7) students have appeared before N5 JLPT test in 2016-17)

COURSE OUTLINE

The course has been designed to introduce the rudiments of Japanese language by emphasising all the four functions of a language, namely, listening, reading, writing, and speaking. It was a course work of about 80 hours divided into three classes a week, each class consisting of one and half an hour duration.

The classes were conducted by using the techniques from Structural-Functional Method, Audio-Lingual Method and Communicative Approach where emphasis was put on learning through repetitive practice and Role Play.

The following is the details of the course work.

Writing system and Lessons

- 1. Hiragana and Katakana Syllabary (五十音図)
- 2. Kanji (漢字): 1 to 100 from Nihongo Challenge (日本語チャレンジ)
- 3. Basic vocabulary pertaining to everyday use regarding a) Introducing oneself and others, b) Asking for destination, c) Requesting for things and favours, d) Invitation and polite denials etc.
- 4. Lessons 1 to 10 from Minna no Nihongo (みんなの日本語)

Evaluation

Week end class tests were conducted to get the feed-back about the achievement level. Further, learners were asked to write short passages after the completion of each lesson.

Expected outcome

Learners have been advised to take the Level 5 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test to be held in July or December, 2022 by the government agencies of Japan. It is expected the learners will be able clear this test with continuous touch with class notes and text book and other materials.

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
