Decision

 Identifying and selecting a course of action out of multiple options.

Example- What is to be done when demand for a particular product shoots up? What to do when people start leaving the organization?

2. To identify an opportunity to act

Example- Scarcity of fossil fuels making the organisations explore the cleaner options like electric energy, solar energy and wind energy

Feature

 It is an inherent part of all management functions like-

Planning, Organizing, Directing, Controlling

•It is about getting solutions for the situations where the resources as-

time, raw materials, technology, people are limited.

Types of Decision

Programmed

Non-programmed

Regular and Routine

Not regular, random/ urgent, unusual

Data is available

Data not available

Example- How much food is to be prepared in canteen; how many buses will move on a day to get children to and from schools

Example- In case of an accident in the workplace !!!!!

Situations for Decision Making

- Certainty
- Risk
- Uncertainty
- Turbulence

Steps in Decision Making

- Identification of the condition/problem
- Find alternatives
- Evaluation of alternatives
- Select the best possible alternative
- Implement
- Follow up/ feedback

Models of Decision Making

Classical Model

<u>Assumptions</u>

All information are gathered, manager is rational not biased, objectives and alternatives are clear

Applicable in situations like – Certainty and risk

Administrative Model

Assumptions

Lack of information, manager is not rational, objectives and alternatives not clear

Applicable in situations like- Uncertainty and turbulence

Attributes affecting decision making

- Intuition past experiences, strong sense and gut feeling
- <u>Satisficing</u>- limiting the effort the moment basic criteria is fulfilled
- Bounded rationality everybody's rationality has a limit
- **Escalation of Commitment** committed to a cause at Any cost
