A lady with an adorable personality, Prof. Sabita Acharya took over as its first woman Vice-Chancellor on November 24, 2020.

Possessed with an enviable record of 33 years of teaching experience along with her distinguished and meritorious contribution in the field of research, Prof. Acharya has carved a niche for herself in the anthropological field both in the national and at the international arena. She was a Post-Doctoral Commonwealth Fellow at the Oxford University in 2002 and thereafter she has never looked back.

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Utkal University Starts Work On Capacity Development Of Staff, Faculty

She has held various positions in her service career as Chairman, PG Council, Director, College Development Council, Director, School of Women's Studies, Coordinator of International Office, Head of the Department of Anthropology, and Coordinator of UGC Centre for Advanced Study (CAS).

She had joined Oxford University, the UK as Commonwealth Post- Doctoral Fellow in 2002. Her contributions cover all the areas of teaching, research, guidance, consultation, and scholastic activities. She had over 33 years of teaching and research guidance including academic administration experiences. On academic and research work Prof. Acharya visited to different countries like the UK, China, Germany, Brazil, and Poland. 13 students have been awarded PhD under her guidance. She has completed many Research Projects including the UGC Major Research Project, Government of Odisha funded Projects and international collaborative projects. Besides that, Prof Acharya penned over 60 research articles, edited three books, and written one book.

What is your feeling as the first women Vice-Chancellor of this age-old university?

It is an empowering feeling, a very challenging assignment indeed. I have studied here, done my research and spent my entire academic career here. I am acquainted with its ecosystem. I always believe that competency and capability should be the supreme consideration and never the gender. Having said that, I am excited about breaking the glass ceiling.

What are the most important challenges before you after your new assignment?

There are multiple challenges which need to be addressed. The most important one is to see that the academic activities are conducted properly during this Covid-19 pandemic situation. More priority has to be given to online teaching-learning method. We need to strengthen the digital infrastructure immediately. This is the need of the hour. We shall go for underground cabling, higher bandwidth for robust internet connectivity and setting up a solar power system for boosting power supply backup. We will emphasise on character building and value creation amongst the students so that they become better citizens. They will be the true ambassadors of this institution. I will focus on completion of the university's physical infrastruc-



tures and their proper maintenance and to make it a Clean, Green and Safe Campus.

What are the plans on your agenda for quality improvement in the varsity's research and academic programmes?

In order to transform the Utkal University to a university of excellence, we have to utilise the intellectual resources by attracting the best minds through recruitment of teachers, engagement of eminent visiting professors from within Odisha and from throughout the country.

Best minds shall produce best quality students. Focus will be on judicious execution of NEP-2020 and implementation of its components like Institutional Development Plan towards knowledge economy through knowledge creation and innovation. We shall adopt a more student-centric approach honouring student diversity, flexibility and freedom to choose learning programmes. We shall focus on research and quality education, multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches. We shall make efforts to create local-global connect in internationalisation of higher education. There is a need for introduction of job-oriented courses like Bio Physics, Bio Chemistry, Cyber Security, Data Science, Artificial Intelligence, Clinical Psychiatry and several others. We shall collaborate with different academic institutions and organisations for the development of Utkal University.

How are you going to make the campus free from the vicious circle of antisocial nonstudents?

I shall take all the necessary steps to make the campus free from the interferences of nonstudents. Students are fundamentally good human beings who are here to study and make their careers. If they are engaged in constructive activities of the university, the chances are less likely of nonstudents influencing them.

What about the restoration of teaching after eight months of the pandemic?

The online teaching-learning process is on and will continue until normalcy is restored after the pandemic.

Anshuman's success is particularly noteworthy, as he has emerged as the topper among the



International Conference on Rural Development In South Asia At Utkal University

The department of Sociology and Global Centre for Rural Studies, on the eve of 150th Birth Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, have organized an International Conference on the theme, interrogating the trends of Rural Development and Social Transformation in South Asia from 2nd to 4th October 2019 in collaboration with Indian Sociological Society and Indian Anthropological Society.

The conference had a special inaugural session on Mahatma and his vision on rural development and social transformation. This marked one of the sixth events of the day launched by the Honourable Vice-Chancellor, Utkal University. The distinguished guests and speakers were welcomed and introduced by the Organizing Secretary of the conference, Dr. Rabindra Garada.

Dr. Garada articulated the reason behind the conference and why a South Asian focus provides better insights into the societies of the region. Their shared history, culture, language and linguistic diversity along with the experience of colonialism make them similar in many ways.

Acknowledging the coexistence of similarity and diversity in the region, he highlighted how the countries in the region have struggled to choose from the western and indigenous development models. This experience in social change, economic development, technology adoption and the engagement with the marginalized communities in South Asia pro-



vides a unique kaleidoscope of lived experience that is relevant for sociologists, anthropologists, economists, policy analysts beyond the region as well.

Prof. Triloki Nath Pandey from The University of California delivered the inaugural address, highlighting the Gandhian ethos practiced in personal life.

He highlighted how Gandhi excelled as an ordinary man and how with an emphasis on physical labor and self-reflection in day-to-day life he attained the extraordinary status of being Mahatma. He presented an elaborate narrative on Gandhi's struggle of being a failure as a barrister to being a successful leader with worldly mundane everyday practices.

Prof. S.K. Chaudhury, from Lucknow University, stressed on re-living Gandhi in the present context. He emphasized that Gandhi's India is village India. India's development is not possible unless and until we follow the Gandhian model of development in village life.

Prof. D.R. Sahu, from Lucknow University, and Secretary, Indian Sociological Society, spoke on the relevance of Gandhi in bringing a just democratic equal society. He presented Gandhi as a blend of 'Culture of Silence' as well 'Culture of Voice'. He argued on the co-presence and co-existence and co-excellence of Rural India, National India, and Global India.

Prof. Annapurna Pandey, an anthropologist from the University of California, talked about re-defining development within the Gandhian paradigm. Here she emphasized the empowerment of rural women through skill India initiative. In her opinion, the skilling of women is a cornerstone for rural development and the core value of the Gandhian model.

Prof. Nelika Mehrotra, Chairperson, The Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), talked about Gandhi's contribution as a political and economic agent. In this context, she focussed on women's movement from the 1970s.

Prof R. Indira, President of Indian Sociological Society (ISA), in her Presidential address, emphasized the needs of longitudinal studies. Micro studies in the local con-

texts, she argued, will help us to understand the nature of social transformation in rural India.

Prof. Soumendra Mohan Patnaik, the Vice-Chancellor of Utkal University brought western and eastern anthropological and sociological theories to interrogate development and transformation in the Indian context.

Interpreting Gandhi, he stressed that no learning is possible without employing the 3Hs – Head, Heart, and Hand. Reflecting on the increasing disjuncture between technology and human values, he argued that technological progress may mean having proportionally decreased humane touch.

Dr. M.G. Bage, Head, Department of Sociology delivered the vote of thanks, in which he thanked the international and national experts and scholars, the Indian Sociological Society and Indian Anthropological Association for collaboration, the Vice-Chancellor for being the guiding force and the organizers and student volunteers for their dedication and hard work.

Academic Panel Advises Utkal University to Use Social Media For Brand Building

A state government-appointed committee has advised Utkal University to use social media and public relations tools for proper branding of the premier institution.

The Academic Review Committee was formed by the Higher Education Department to assess the performance of Utkal University. The five-member committee is headed by Odisha State Higher Education Council Vice-Chair-

man Asoka Kumar Das, The Times of India reported. The committee has furnished a report that suggested several measures to the university to improve its quality and ranking. "Branding and public relations is considered as a necessary component in every university.

It is also important for national and international rankings, which determine peer perception. However, at present, all that the university has done is to list its future intentions. In actuality, there has been no perceptible concrete achievement in terms of documentation, website upgradation, presence on social sites or alumni programmes, except for the mega alumni meet during the 75th year celebrations," the report said. Recommending concrete actions, the report emphasised on the importance of the university having its own social media handles. All activities of the university should be highlighted through social media, it added.

Utkal University Holds Workshop Based On Oxfam Inequality Report 2020

The Global Centre for Rural Studies, Utkal University organised a one day workshop on Inequality and its impact during Covid-19 today in collaboration with Oxfam India. Oxfam India's latest India supplement, "The Inequality Virus" that was released on the opening day of the World Economic Forum's Davos Dialogues, was presented in the workshop by Dr. Pravas Ranjan Mishra, Programme Officer, Oxfam India.

The report has found that the wealth of Indian billionaires increased by 35 percent during the lockdown. In fact the increase in wealth of the top 11 billionaires of India during the pandemic could sustain the NREGS scheme for 10 years or the health ministry for 10 years.

Speaking about the lockdown imposed during the Corona virus outbreak, Dr. Pravas Mishra pointed out that India introduced one of the earliest and most stringent lockdowns in the face of the pandemic.

The enforcement of the lockdown brought the economy to a standstill triggering unemployment, hunger, distress migration and untold



hardship in its wake. The rich were able to escape the pandemic's worst impact, and wile the white-collar workers isolated themselves and worked from home, a majority of the not so fortunate Indians lost their livelihood.

Mr. Anil Pradhan Convener Odisha RTE Forum spoke on the educational inequalities that have increased due to the pandemic. He said, "inequalities were always there, the pandemic made them worse and more visible." He further added that only 14 percent students in the state has access to internet thereby cutting their access to online education which remains the primary mode of education in the pandemic. The long disruption

of schooling risked doubling the rate of out of school, especially among the poor. Only 4 percent of rural households had a computer and less than 15 percent rural households had an internet connection in the country.

"Social inequality serves as the basic infrastructure of all inequalities. Students need to understand it and put efforts to dismantle this structure, "said Prof. Basant Kumar Mallik, Chairman, PG Council, Utkal University in his keynote address. He talked about Dr. B. R. Ambedkar's last speech where he talked about political equality as enshrined in our constitution cannot coexist with widening social and economical inequity.

The speakers spoke

Artefacts Discovered by the students of Utkal University at Garhabangara village in Puri

Utkal University students have discovered artefacts, which, experts say, belong to the period of Mauryan emperor Ashoka, at Garhabangara village in Puri district.

Ashoka had ruled most of the Indian subcontinent from 268 BC to 232 BC. The excavated site is located 89km from Bhubaneswar and 17km from Konark, Varsity students Ramakant Pradhan, Kailasha Bhoi, Purna Chandra Gohayata and Susanta Kumar Das, under the guidance of assistant professor Anam Behera of the department of ancient Indian history, culture and archaeology of Utkal University, conducted the excavation on August 26.

Findings of the exploration include stopper, terracotta dog handle that belongs to a pottery, red



slip ware, bed ware, stamped pottery, net sinker, Maratona ware of Myanmar, Chinese porcelain and celadon, earthen hopscotch, ill-fired red ware and a fragmented terracotta wheel ring.

'The location of Dhauli and Sisupalgarh on the upper part of the Kushabhadra, Daya and Bhargavi rivers were well connected with Garhabangara village on the Kushabhadra river mouth and Manikapatans in the Chilika,'

said Behera. 'Such proximity to the Daya and Bhargavi river mouth proves maritime importance of these rivers, for which material from Greece and other parts of the world reached to Sisupalgarh.

These activities date back to the Ashokan era. The discovery of a stopper among the excavated materials further confirms the period of the find,' he said. The excavated site is located between the Haraparvati temple at the village and the right bank of the Kushabhadra. These sites are 5km from the well-known port site Khalkatapatana on the same river bank near the sea coast,' said Behera.

More excavation will be conducted in the sites under guidance of the Archaeological Survey of India shortly. Earlier, the varsity students had found 4,500-year-old artefacts at various locations in Khurda district and a 1,400-year-old Buddha idol.

The students had, in June, discovered rock shelters in the Khandapada forest range in Nayagarh district. 'We have been conducting a number of excavations in various parts of the state. We are in touch with the ASI and the state archaeology to carry forward research and find out the exact date of the findings,' said Behera.

Geology Museum of Utkal University Renovated

Renovated Geology Museum of Dept of Geology Utkal University was reopened here in the university campus. The museum features a spectacular array of rare minerals including silicate structures, 375 crystal models, 215 types of rock forming and 145 types of industrial minerals, large stock of plutonic, hypabysal and volcanic igneous rocks, clastic and non-clastic sedimentary rocks and different varieties of metamorphic rocks.

The museum also displays several types of invertebrate, vertebrate and plant fossils of different geological horizons, Survey of India toposheets, relief maps, imageries and many more articles of importance.

The university officials said Tata Steel as part of CSR initiatives helped to renovate the museum.

Odisha's Utkal University filed 1 patent in 5 years, says Comptroller and Auditor General of India

Of 49 research projects taken up with government grants of Rs 3 crore, only 8 were completed till Jan 2020

Although counted among the State's top higher education institutions, Utkal University has been found floundering in facilitating academic research, both in terms of quantity and quality.

The report on Outcomes of Higher Education by Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) tabled in the Assembly on Thursday has pointed out that from 2014-15 to 2018-19, although funds were allocated to the university to carry out research projects, it failed in doing so.

In these five years, 49 research projects were taken up in Utkal with government grants of Rs 3.09 cr but only eight could be completed till January 2020. Stating that the percentage of research works of Utkal remained at only 16 pc, the report said that the research and development cells of the university also did not monitor utilisation of funds allocated for the purpose as a result of which, the reason behind delay could not be ascertained in the audit. Worse, only one patent was published in 2017-18 during the five years period but has not been granted yet.

The university today enjoys an A+ grade by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). However, although NAAC gives the maximum points to any university which has at least 20 patents or more for

accreditation, Utkal University failed to score any grade point based on this criterion. The report stated that adequate opportunities were also not provided to faculty members to attend professional development training programs and only five of the 138 faculty members in the period got international fellowships for advanced study.

As far as collaborating with other universities and industries for research and learning is concerned, Utkal signed only eight national and one international MoUs in five years, which is way less than the NAAC benchmark of at least 30 MoUs in the same period. The only silver lining was that the 138 faculty members pub-

lished 1,984 papers in UGC notified journals - an average of 14 papers per teacher - which helped the university score maximum grade points for NAAC accreditation.

On the other hand, the Ministry of Education introduced a new parameter 'research' in the National Institution Ranking Framework (NIRF) this year.

Although Utkal university was the only State-run varsity to find a spot in the top-100 ranking, it could not score a rank under the research parameter. Only 5 of 138 faculty members got international fellowships for advanced study. Utkal signed only 8 national and 1 international MoUs in five years.

UC Berkeley to Lend Tech Support to Utkal University

500 Companies will Help the University Execute the Skill Development Programmes

Utkal University will sign memorandum understanding (MoU) with the US-based University of California, Berkeley, for exchange of ideas and technical support. A threemember team of the foreign university is set to visit India on 2019 January 15. Though the place for inking the pact has not been decided yet, Utkal University authorities said it may take place in New Delhi. Soumendra Mohan Patnaik, vice-chancellor of Utkal University, said, "The MoU will help us receive technical advice on skill development and

entrepreneurship from UC Berkeley. They will help us develop ideas to conduct joint projects and work on successful models. They have successfully implemented several models in Africa, America and other countries. They have the expertise to create entrepreneurs and skilled manpower."

Patnaik said entreprene urship development and wage employment would be the twin themes of their training modules. "We will try to create entrepreneurs and skilled manpower here. The focus will be on traditional

skills such as painting, architecture, appliqué work, sculpting and weaving while creating entrepreneurship models. The trainees will be taught to add value to these traditional vocations," he added.

The university will set up a rural technology park on its second campus in in Jajpur district as part of its skill development and entrepreneurship initiatives funded by Centre;s Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksa Abhiyan(RUSA) programme.

"The MoU with the foreign university will help the technology park create successful training modules. The Centre had recently approved Rs 15 crore under RUSA to carry out skill development and entrepreneurship initiatives of which the technology park is a part. It will help promote and develop indigenous technology.

The park will come up on land measuring 10 acres in the middle of the second campus, spread over 68 acres at Chandikhole. It will be set up soon," said Patnaik.

Fortune 500 companies will help the university execute the skill development programmes, sources said.

It will be tasked to prepare online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new and emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum.

The Anthropology Department is one among 75 NRCs selected across the country in the first phase as part of a major and unique initiative of online professional development. As per the programme, about 15 lakh higher education faculties would use the Massive Open Online Courses (MOOC) platform Swayam for knowledge update.

Apart from State Universities, IISc, IUCAA, IITs, IISERs, NITs, National Institutes for Technical Teachers

The Post Graduate Department of Anthropology was established in 1958. It started functioning under the stewardship of Late Professor Dr. Ayinapalli. Aiyappan and witnessed a new phase of its growth with Professor Dr. Lakshman Kumar Mahapatra as its Professor and Head in 1967.

In 1978, the Department was selected for Faculty Improvement Programme by the University Grants Commission (UGC), New Delhi, as one of the three University Departments in the whole country. The Department has the distinction of being the first Anthropology Department in the country to have been awarded the ASHISS grant by the UGC. The Department was accorded Department of Special Assistance status (DSA Programme) by UGC for three successive phases from 1988 to 2007. It has the further distinction of being one of the two Departments in the country to have been accorded the Centre of Advanced Study status by the University Grants Commission. At this moment, the second phase of CAS (UGC-CAS-II) has been accorded to the Department.

In 2018 The Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) notified Anthropology department as the only centre in Odisha as National Resource Centres (NRC) in Anthropology. The NRCs has prepared 40 online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new and emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum.

Training (NITTTRs), IIITs and Open Universities have been notified as NRCs. The resource centres would cover wide range of disciplines including Social Sciences, Humanities, Language Teaching, Commerce, Management, Sciences, Engineering and Technology, Design and Manufacturing, Public Policy, Leadership

and Governance, Astronomy and Astrophysics and cutting edge areas of Nano-sciences.

Director of UGC's Human Resource Development Centre (HRDC) Prof Jayanta Parida said NRCs would prepare study module for college teachers and help them remain updated about latest developments in their respective fields.

"The technology based online refresher course would provide an enabling opportunity to all in-service teachers, irrespective of their subject and seniority to keep abreast with the latest developments in their respective disciplines," he said.

The NRCs will publish the list of certified faculties by December 31 who will develop the refresher module as per the latest trends by June 15 every year. The training materials will be made available through Swayam to all teachers by October 1 and based on the response, the course can be repeated in the following January.

"A five member experts' committee on each discipline would prepare the module and after thorough review it would be uploaded on the web. The teachers after going through the training materials will appear for a test and a good result would help in their career progression and counted as score of academic performance indicators," Prof Parida added.


PM Modi laid the founda-


The members of the group said that the main idea behind forrming the group was to promote good literature and reading activities among readers.

This book club assumes greater significance among readers who love classics because these days most of the young readers confine themselves to reading works of the like Chetan Bhagat or Durjoy Datta.

So far tthe group has read books like Beowulf, The Three Theban plays, The Frogs, The Trojan



Women, The Brothers Karamazov, Letters to a young poet, The Bear Came Over the Mountain among others and has watched films like The Help, The King's Speech, The Devil Wears Prada, Vertigo, Murder on the Orient Express among others.

Reading Group—ARIEL (Ardent Readers and Interpreters of English Literature) came into existence when a small group of research scholars, pursuing their MPhil and PhD, came together on 18 November 2012 under the initiative of Prof. Himansu S Mohapatra to form a reading group that would occasionally double up as a film viewing group.

The intention was to read the great books, ancient as well as contemporary, which have shaped mankind but remained out of the curricular space and were paid scant attention to in the all too brief M.A days. Thus began the journey of the Ardent Readers and Interpreters of English Literature, with its acronym ARIEL when the group met for the first time on 12 December 2012 to discuss the Anglo-Saxon epic Beowulf, the oldest available long poem in the history of English literature dating back to the 12th century.

The reading group aims to cultivate a love for reading and discussing books outside of the students' syl-

labus. It aims to foster an alternative approach to reading that goes beyond a strictly academic interpretation of literary texts.

The group seeks to promote shared reading experiences and create a comfortable space where students and teachers can engage in personal and informal conversations about books.

Due to the pandemic, the group has been unable to physically meet at the department but has adapted to the virtual platform and continued its activities. The meetings are recorded with meticulous attention to detail, and the minutes are shared electronically among the group's members.

The primary objective behind this practice is to promote the love for literature through shared reading and ARIEL remains a little beacon of hope in a screen-obsessed world.
